10:15 the program ended, the meeting resumed at 10:35 a.m.

Secretary Report – Joy Paugh: The February minutes were printed in the newsletter. No changes or corrections, the minutes stand as printed.

Treasurers Report – Diane Tewell: February ending bank balance: \$3,201.27. February savings account balance: \$33,135.63.

BOOK IT!

Reviews of Books from the Guild Library



Appliqué in Bloom by Gabrielle Swain. 1994. Comes with 3 patterns in an envelope.

This is a beginner's book that takes you through all the preparation stages, such as fabric selection, to basic needle turn applique techniques. Lots of color illustrations show the beauty of applique. There are "tip" boxes throughout the text that address basic issues just in case you need them. There is a detailed "troubleshooting" section that discusses common errors, such as curves, points, and fraying, and how to fix them.

The book includes 3 sheets of patterns. There are a dozen basic patterns and some complementary ones, but the book also includes border patterns. The chapter on finishing the block includes a stippling technique for shading. Shading enhances the blossoms, berries, leaves, and stems covered in this book.

Youth Sewing

We had a total of 8 youths attend our Spring sewing class. They had the opportunity to learn the basics of sewing on a machine and by learning the basic safety of sewing tools, iron and their sewing machine. They constructed a Drawstring Backpack perfect for any use. Working with cotton fabric and a pattern they manage to cut their pattern, iron the fabric and sew a casing, zig zag and straight stitch. All the youth were able to complete their bag.

She thanked members of the Guild and her family for giving her renewed interest and resources to "reach my dream of designing my own fashion line."




Small Quilt Auction! Ready, Set, Go!





Blue Bonnet Retreaters Challenge





- 1. At least a 2" square of the fabric must be showing on the front of your guilted item.
- 2. No more than 1 fat quarter of the Challenge fabric can be used. In other words, you cannot purchase more of the Challenge fabric for your quilted item.
- 3. You may add as many other fabrics as you wish to you Challenge entry as there are no size requirements.
- 4. Please DO NOT let other members see your item since we will be voting on them at the Retreat.


